Chesapeake Beach Remembers September 11th

On a sunny Sunday afternoon, a day much like September 11, 2001, hundreds of citizens of Chesapeake Beach gathered at Veterans' Park to commemorate the 10th anniversary of the disaster that we know now as 9/11.

Mayor Bruce Wahl welcomed attendees and dignitaries, and following the Presentation of the Colors by the Knights of Columbus Lord Baltimore Assembly Color Corp, the Fathers & Sons Quartet sang the *Star Spangled Banner*.

Mayor Wahl, Former Mayor Gerald Donovan, Maryland Senate President Mike Miller and Congressman Steny Hoyer each spoke briefly and remembered those who fell that day – the first responders, the victims of the Twin Towers in New York City, the fallen at the Pentagon in Washington, DC and the crew and passengers on the flight that went down in Somerset County, PA.

As the speakers recalled that dreadful day, a gentle rain began to fall from a cloudless sky. After a moment of silence, the rain stopped and a Peace Ballet was performed by Abigail Francisco's School of Classical Ballet to the song *Imagine* by John Lennon. Clare O'Shea then sang a memorable rendition of *God Bless America*. As she concluded the song, a flock of white doves was released over the Chesapeake Bay. The program concluded with the playing of *Taps*.

From the Mayor

Fires, Floods, Earthquakes, Hurricanes, Railway Trail and Oysters!

We've had quite a summer! Despite all of the adversity, Chesapeake Beach has once again met all of the challenges and even managed a celebration. It has been my honor and privilege to lead the town staff during this time. Please indulge me as I share some of the highlights of the summer with you.

Fire

In the wee small hours of October 10, I was awakened by sirens – lots and lots of sirens! The scary thing was that they stopped nearby. Then my cell phone rang with a call from Clara Mae Buckmaster. I jumped out of bed, dressed and ran across the street to see what was happening. I was upset to learn that one of Chesapeake Beach's landmark businesses was burning - Abner's Crab House.

The volunteers from North Beach Volunteer Fire Department did their typical wonderful job, and were joined by firefighters from Dunkirk, Huntingtown and Prince Frederick Volunteer Fire Departments. Anne Arundel firefighters from Deale and Lothian also assisted. NBVFD Chief Donald Gibson told me that over 60 firefighters responded.

Fortunately the damage was mostly limited to a second floor storage area, and no one was injured. Bobby Abner indicated to me that he hopes to repair and re-open the restaurant in two to three months. Let's hope so!

Floods, Earthquakes and Hurricanes

The August 23rd earthquake, centered near Mineral, Virginia, was felt here in Chesapeake Beach, but fortunately produced no significant damage. This was not the case in nearby

Washington, DC, where the Washington Monument and the National Cathedral have been closed ever since. We were lucky on this one.

Just a few days later on August 27th and 28th, Hurricane Irene was not nearly as benevolent. With an incredible amount of soaking rain and bursts of very high winds, we learned first-hand what a problem the tulip poplar trees that are so predominant in our town can be. All roads in and out of town were blocked, many homes and businesses were without power, and in general, it was a difficult time. But true to our small town core, our fellow citizens stepped up to help, and the town emerged with flying colors.

I want to point out the work of several volunteers and staff members that was "above and beyond the call of duty". First, our Town Administrator, Jim Parent, returned early from his weekend home in Delaware to keep town hall open. Jim spent the night at town hall, answering phones and coordinating the staff's activities. Bob and Sharon Munro and Councilman Bob Carpenter and his wife Pat (with a list of titles too long to put here) volunteered to handle calls at town hall to give Jim an occasional break. Town receptionist Kathy Johnson also helped out. Project Manager Wilson Cochran coordinated our efforts by situating himself at the Calvert County Emergency Operations Center in the Court House in Prince Frederick. The Public Works crew, under the supervision of Superintendent Jay Berry did a remarkable job of clearing streets of downed trees, monitoring and making adjustments to the water and sewer systems as needed, and whatever else was required to keep the town running smoothly. The Chesapeake Beach Railway Trail Awaits You!!!

Town leaders dedicate the long-awaited Trail

The Town of Chesapeake Beach formally dedicated its new Railway Trail on Friday, September 30th at 4:00 pm. The Dedication took place at the head of the Trail, just off Gordon Stinnett Avenue near the Tot Lot, where colorful balloons and “train music” got everyone in the mood for the celebration.

Congressman Steny Hoyer, State Senator Mike Miller, County Commissioner Pat Nutter and Former Mayor Gerald Donovan joined with Mayor Bruce Wahl, the Chesapeake Beach Town Council, other Town, County and State leaders, Railway Museum officials, and citizens of the area to officially open this long-awaited trail to walkers, runners, hikers, bicyclers...and all citizens of all ages. “It’s a wonderful place to explore and observe the magic of living in this beautiful area,” said Chesapeake Beach Mayor Bruce Wahl. “This was well worth the wait!”

More than 150 people turned out to celebrate the occasion, and following the ribbon cutting, Mayor Wahl invited everyone to “take a walk” on the new Trail. Experts were available along the trail to answer questions and provide additional information about the fish, wildlife, CBOCS oyster program and fascinating history of the Railway Trail.

Be Prepared! Hurricane Preparation

With the passing of Hurricane Irene we have received many questions about how to be better prepared for future hurricanes. Here are some simple tips to remember for next time.

Water - You need one gallon of water per person per day – and don't forget about your pets. If you are on Town water, the Town has three towers, each with a back-up generator, so your water will continue to flow even if power is out at your house. If you are on a well, fill water jugs and all bath tubs; use the water in the tubs to flush toilets.

Septic - If you have anything other than a grinder pump your toilets should function normally. For grinder pumps, manually pump your grinder pit down before the power goes out. There should be a control box with a red light on top near the pit, inside should be a switch with "run, stop, and auto." Move the switch to "run" to pump the pit down, then put it back to "auto." This should give you 100+ gallons of capacity, depending on the size of your pit. A generator can also be used but this should be done by a licensed electrician. Or, a septic service can be called to pump your pit out if the outage is extended.

Food - Keep at least 3 days of non-perishable food on hand. You can fill old milk jugs with water and freeze them beforehand to help keep a refrigerator cold while the power is out. When the water melts it can be used as drinking water.

Safety - Have a hand-cranked, or battery-operated radio, flashlights, plenty of batteries, and a first aid kit. A whistle for signaling and dust masks should also be considered. A basic tool box, local maps, and cell phone with charger are good ideas too. Listen to all public notices and evacuate if told to do so. Keep the numbers for your local utilities by the phone, along with emergency and non-emergency police, fire, and rescue numbers.




What I am Reading

Oysters

It would not be a 2011 Chesapeake Beach newsletter without an article about oysters. The Chesapeake Beach Oyster Cultivation Society (CBOCS) completed the first phase of the oyster gardening project for the 2011 – 2012 year. About 40 volunteers, under the guidance of CBOCS Chairman Keith Pardieck showed up on September 17 to install twenty-four

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oyster cages. Each cage is now supporting between 5000 and 6000 oyster spat, for a total of somewhere between 120,000 to 150,000 young oysters in Fishing Creek. What a significant accomplishment. Congratulations and thanks to everyone involved! Don't miss the additional photos on page 21 showing the activities of the CBOCS crew as they filled and installed the oyster cages along Fishing Creek.

Trash

As we have explained before, we changed our trash and recycling contractor to Southern Maryland Recycling on July 1. When we put this out to bid, we made several changes to economize. First, we are limiting the second weekly trash pickup to be only between Memorial Day and Labor Day. Second, we are picking up recycling every other week from now on. In order to make this work, we are making available new larger recycling containers. These changes would have occurred regardless of which company won the bid, as we were seeking to reduce our costs.

Since we started curbside recycling pickup in 1991, more and more materials have become acceptable to recycle. In all likelihood, most of what has been going into the trash may be able to go into recycling. Besides being the "green" thing to do, this saves us as taxpayers quite a bit of money, since we do not have to pay the \$62 per ton tipping fee to dump in the county landfill. The staff and I are always looking at ways to save taxpayer money, and this is one fairly easy way to do so. Please help us to achieve this goal. You'll find more detailed information about trash schedules in this issue on page 17.

Let's Get Ready for Winter!

**This article appeared in last year's Fall Newsletter...
 ...and it is worth repeating as we head into winter.**

Summer faded, fall is here and next, of course, is winter. In 2009, we learned that snow is a four letter word. With that in mind, I'd like to reflect on the past and use that experience to prepare us for the potential upcoming weather events.

Having lived in Chesapeake Beach for 18 years, I can't say I recall a winter with two large, back-to-back storms like we had in 2009. Clearing the Town's roads during these blizzards gave me the opportunity to see firsthand the unselfishness of our citizens and their patience in dealing with the snow and our efforts to clear the streets. I'd like to especially thank the citizens in town who did more than their share. For example, they helped shovel neighbors' driveways, cleared a path to an elderly person's mailbox or simply gave someone a ride to the store. This list could go on and on. I saw and spoke with many of you in the days following those snow storms. Your help in times like that does not go unnoticed and is much appreciated. Thanks again!

Now, let's talk about planning for this winter. We have built an entire new salt dome. The old salt dome was in failing condition and had to be removed prior to the 2009 storms. The new dome helps us by not only holding twice the salt, but it also keeps the salt dry and ready for use at a moment's notice.

Here are some tips regarding what you, as a citizen of the town, can do to help:

- Any car that is on the street hinders our snow removal effort. Even removing one car from the street

can make a big difference. If cars are left on the street we have no choice but to plow around them. In theory, if the entire street is free of cars, we can plow shoulder to shoulder, clearing the entire road

and leaving plenty of parking space. In many areas this is not possible, but working with your neighbors and parking on just one side of the road would help considerably.

- The town will try to clear all mailboxes whenever possible. However, when storms are as severe as they were in 2009, our efforts will be focused on opening up all town roads and alleys first.

This allows the emergency equipment to access all areas of town...a higher priority than mail service.

- Please try to prepare for the storm prior to the event. This would include going to the store to buy necessities. Any car on the road during, or just after, a snow storm may result in our plow drivers not only having to stop, but also...in a lot of cases...having to back down narrow roads.

I hope everyone has enjoyed their summer. I am not looking forward to a winter like the winter of 2009, but if it happens the town is ready to handle it!

There's a lot to be said about TRASH. As you know, we have a new trash collection service in town, so some changes have been made. As we settle in to these new schedules and services, we hope to make it easier for all of the citizens of the town. Through this article and our website www.chesapeake-beach.md.us/trashschedule.htm we hope to have this information at your fingertips at a moment's notice!

NEW TRASH LINK – We now have a direct link to information about trash collection on our website! Easy to find, it is located on the homepage on the left side as a navigational button. In the dark green area on the left, you will find...just below the little box that says "submit" a button that says "TRASH SERVICES." Click on this button to find all the information you will need about trash.

PICK-UP CALENDARS – We have also printed calendars for November December & January in this issue of the Newsletter. (see next page). You might want to cut them out and post them in a convenient place in your home for your reference.

SCHEDULES:

North Side (North of Route 260, including Bayview Hills, Captain's Quarters & Windward Key)

- Regular trash collection day is MONDAY
- Recycling day is EVERY OTHER THURSDAY

NOTE: Additional Summer Trash Pick-ups on Thursdays now run from Memorial Day through Labor Day. Grass clippings and leaves will continue to be picked up on your regular trash day, but must be bagged and put out next to your regular trash.

South Side (South of Route 260 and including Richfield Station)

- Regular trash collection day is TUESDAY
- Recycling day is EVERY OTHER FRIDAY

NOTE: Additional Summer Trash Pick-ups on Fridays now run from Memorial Day through Labor Day. Grass clippings and leaves will continue to be picked up on your regular trash day, but must be bagged and put out next to your regular trash.

HOLIDAYS COMING UP – Generally, pick up will be a day later than normal pick up days.

- Thanksgiving – 11/24/11 (Thursday)
- Christmas – 12/24/11 (Sunday)
- New Years Day – 1/1/12 (Sunday)

NOTE: Since Christmas and New Years Day fall on Sunday this year, AS OF NOW, the trucks will run a regular pick-up that week, and there will be no delay.

FINALLY...ABOUT THOSE GIANT RECYCLING BINS:

If you love them, GREAT! If you DON'T LOVE THEM, and want to exchange your big blue bin for a smaller size blue bin (about the size of a regular garbage can), call Town Hall and let us know you want to trade. Give us your address, and we will happily switch your can!

NOTE: In an effort to help establish this new schedule, the Town will post signs regarding recycling pick up each week through the end of the year.

A Tackle Shop with a Rich History **Tyler's Tackle Shop & Crab House**

Famous for its fresh local crabs, crab meat and seafood, as well as its outstanding cole slaw, shrimp salad and seafood salad, Tyler's Tackle Shop & Crab House has become an institution in Chesapeake Beach!

It all began back in 1960, when Calvin C. Tyler, Sr., a roofer by trade, began making bucktails (fishing lures) and selling them to the VFW. Mr. Tyler hired Buddy Kellam to move an old schoolhouse to the current location of Tyler's Tackle Shop near the corner of Hwy. 260 and 261. Tyler took off the porch of the school, added a front room, and added the crab house and space



onto the back portion of the building which served as the living quarters for he and his wife Mary during the summer

months. Calvin Tyler, Jr. and his wife Pearl also worked in the family business for many years. Upon retirement, Calvin and Mary sold the business to George and Ann Klein.

For 30 years, the face you saw when you stopped by the Tackle Shop was that of Pearl Tyler King – who you probably know as “Miss Pearl.” She came to Tyler's when she married Calvin Tyler, Jr. and never left...until this past July when she decided to “take some time off.” Pearl loved her customers and had a way of making each customer feel special while providing them with fishing information, tips and lots of laughter. She refers to her time at Tyler's as “the best time of my life.”

For the past 15 years, Tyler's has been owned and operated by George Klein, Jr., who prior to that was a local waterman on the Chesapeake Bay. George offers a full range of the latest fishing tackle. If they're catching fish anywhere in the mid-Bay area, George and his capable staff will know about it. He makes his own parachutes on the premises. Whether you are going bottom fishing, live lining or trolling, George has what you need. Rods, reels, hooks, sinkers and of course bait.

Four years ago, George's sister Evelyn Newman and Lou Hyde wanted to try their hands at the seafood side



of the business. Evelyn and Lou enjoy dealing with the public and take great pride in the seafood and other products they sell. The fresh seafood and crabs make this stop special. The entire Tyler's Tackle Shop family has great community spirit, generously support town activities and sponsor a couple of youth baseball teams. They always do a great job decorating the Tackle Shop, Crab House and George's boat “Bay Hog” for the holidays, and they challenge all businesses in town to join them in the Brightest Beacon on the Bay contest!

Presently, George, long-time worker Barbara Paddy and George's sister Cathy run the Tackle Shop side while Evelyn and Lou operate the seafood side.

Plan to stop by Tyler's and meet these wonderful people. And while you're there, buy some local crabmeat, shrimp or try the seafood salad! The Tackle Shop is open from April through December, and the Crab House is open all year round. Fishing Creek Water Testing Project

Responding to a request from the Chesapeake Beach Oyster Cultivation Society (CBOCS), a group of volunteers was formed to test the water quality of Fishing Creek. This was done to document the effect that oysters would have on cleaning up the creek.

After an initial planning meeting, five locations were selected to be monitored. Three of these are along the Chesapeake Beach Railway Trail where the oysters are placed, and two are further upstream at private piers.

Working with the Chesapeake Biological Laboratory, monitoring parameters were established. For oyster health it is important to measure dissolved oxygen, salinity, pH, and turbidity. Monitoring equipment for these parameters was either fabricated, purchased or borrowed from the Chesapeake Beach Waste Water Treatment Facility.

Volunteers now collect and analyze samples every other Saturday morning. The initial results show that the creek is very dependent on the amount of rainfall that blankets the watershed. After a large rain the salinity is generally lower and the turbidity (cloudiness) higher. Parameters are also temperature-dependent, especially the dissolved oxygen level which is critical to oyster health.

To date, we have not seen a time when the oysters have been in significant danger. Monitoring will continue throughout

the next nine months while the oysters are in the creek. After that time, the oysters will be transferred to the bay reef.

An additional water testing element is being added which will determine the Total Maximum Daily Limit (TMDL) of nutrients and solids flowing to the Chesapeake Bay. This incorporates measurement of stream flow and analysis of phosphorous, nitrates and total suspended solids. This will add to our knowledge of the health of Fishing Creek and its effect on the Chesapeake Bay.

Exciting News Regarding the Skateboard Park planned for Kellam's Field Recreation Complex


As shown in the drawing below, the Skateboard Park Committee will recommend to the full Town Council awarding the contract for the design phase of the Skateboard Park project to Wally Hollyday Design of Aliso Viego, California. "I don't anticipate any problem with the Council approving our recommendation" said Committee Chair Councilman Bob Carpenter. "Over the year and one-half we have been meeting, none of my colleagues have voiced any opposition to this exciting addition to our Town. And, why would someone vote against our kids?"

Of the five plans we received, the preliminary design of Wally Hollyday Design incorporated all the elements that we requested and will provide an excellent skateboarding experience for all age and skill levels. Once the contract is

awarded, Wally Hollyday Design will have approximately 90 days to fine tune their design. Their final design will be based on input provided by our skateboarders, their parents and others in the community interested in the project at a community-wide meeting that will be scheduled once Council approval is given.

Following completion of the design and approval by the Council, construction can begin. We expect the construction to take about six months meaning the Park could be open by early summer.



News from the Sheriff's Office

On September 6, 2011, Dfc. Burggraff and his K-9 partner Manchi entered an intensive 18 weeks Basic Patrol Dog Course. The course is held at the Calvert County Sheriff's Office K-9 training facility, Island Creek, Port Republic Maryland.

During the 18 week course Dfc. Burggraff, K-9 Manchi and four other K-9 teams learn to track suspects, locate evidence and lost articles, apprehend criminals, conduct building and area searches, complete basic obedience drills, complete an obstacle course along with other various police K-9 tactics.

In addition, Dfc. Burggraff and the other handlers will learn to Decoy for other police dogs in bite work and scenarios. He will also be required to pass a 100 question written exam and a practical certification that covers all elements of the school with his dog.
